

## Kelowna Retirement Homes

Kelowna Retirement Homes - Continuing care retirement communities are specialized facilities wherein individuals are able to stay for the rest of their lives, even if the level of care they need changes. Another common name for these kinds of communities is life care communities. Lots of continuing care communities are operated by organizations, at times religious groups. Many members of the community may be from the same religious group, but usually there are people of many faiths in one facility.

Various levels of requirements are normally catered at some areas within the facility. This enables people to reside within the same community and keep the same network of neighbors, acquaintances and friends, rather than being separated from their current life due to a change in medical condition. This differs greatly from most specialized retirement facilities, which normally offer one particular level of care like for instance skilled nursing or assisted living. Lots of facilities are set up similar to school campuses where there are lots of different kinds of housing offered. The levels of care provided vary from independent living, or very little care, to respite care facilities, where a high level of care is normally necessary, either for a short or a long term. A person could start their stay at a continuing care retirement community living independently in a townhouse, apartment or house. As they age their medical condition may change, that may require them to transfer to a different section of the facility, instead of to a different community altogether. For example, it could become difficult for an individual to keep up with daily tasks like for instance cooking and cleaning, due to a chronic condition such as arthritis. In this case, a person would have assisted living care offered to them. If they have surgery which needs twenty four hour care or become extremely sick, they might be transferred to a skilled nursing facility or a respite nursing facility on the campus.

To enter a continuing care retirement community, a contract is signed with the facility that agrees to offer care for the duration of a person's life. Normally, an entry fee is necessary, that is often utilized as a down payment for housing. Then, residents should pay a monthly fee depending on the level of attention which they require. This fee would likely change as the level of requirement changes. This is not always suitable for elderly residents who do not have a retirement income source or family members that can help pay for care, specially the entry fee. Because seniors pay only for the services utilized, if they continue to be active and healthy, they would not be charged for skilled nursing or assisted living care.

When deciding if a facility is appropriate, an overnight visit should be arranged before a senior decides to sign a contract. One must always research the accreditation of a facility that they are considering. Numerous nations will have an accreditation agency which oversees retirement homes and how they are run.
